

Disqualifying Convictions in Kentucky

If you have been convicted of one or more of the following convictions in Kentucky, you do not have the right to vote per a 2019 executive order. However, there is chance to restore your voting rights through a petition of the governor. Reach out to a local voting rights advocacy group for more information!

Any capital offense;	Bribery in an election (KRS 521);	Promoting a sexual performance by a minor (KRS 531.320);
Any Class A felony;	Criminal abuse 1st (KRS 508.100);	Unlawful transaction with a minor 1st (KRS 530.064(1)(a));
Any Class B felony involving death of the victim or serious physical injury to a victim;	Reckless Homicide (KRS 507.050);	Use of a minor in a sexual performance (KRS 531.310);
Any Class B felony involving attempted murder if the victim of the offense is a clearly identifiable peace officer or firefighter acting in the line of duty, regardless of whether an injury results (KRS 506.010);	Burglary 1st accompanied by commission or attempted commission of an assault described in KRS 508.010, 508.020, 508.032, or 508.060;	Burglary 1st accompanied by commission or attempted commission of kidnapping (KRS 509.040);
Any Felony Sexual Offense (KRS 510);	Fetal Homicide 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or 4th (KRS 507A);	Robbery 1st (KRS 515.020);
Any attempted felony sexual offense (KRS Chapter 510);	Human Trafficking (KRS 529.100);	Strangulation 1st (KRS 508.170);
Assault 1st or 2nd (KRS 508.020);	Manslaughter 1st or 2nd (KRS 507.030-.040);	Treason
Assault under extreme emotional disturbance (KRS 508.040(a));	Murder (KRS 507.020);	Any felony conviction from a federal or out-of-state court
