REGISTERING TO VOTE IN ALABAMA

If you meet all the requirements to register to vote in Alabama, you can register in multiple ways:

— 1 —

Online: Check your registration or register to vote at alabamavotes.gov. You can only register online if you have an Alabama driver's license or non-driver ID.

— 2 —

By mail: Complete and submit a mail-in voter registration form (NVRA-2). Registration forms can be mailed to the Board of Registrars in the county in which you reside, or the Secretary of State's office at: Office of the Secretary of State, Elections Division, PO Box 5616, Montgomery, AL 36103.

— 3 —

In person: Visit your local Board of Registrars and submit a registration form in person.

Do you meet the CERV requirements?

If you meet all of the requirements below, you can restore your voting rights by applying for a Certificate of Eligibility to Register to Vote.

— 1 —

You have no criminal felony charges pending against you in any state or federal court.

— 2 —

You have paid all fines, court costs, fees, and victim restitution ordered by the sentencing court at the time of sentencing on disqualifying cases.

— 3 —

You have successfully completed your full disqualifying sentence, including probation or parole.

APPLY FOR A CERTIFICATE



A CERV application is a one-page form requesting your contact information, some details of your disqualifying conviction(s), and your signature. Use the QR code to print, complete, and submit to Pardons & Paroles. Expect to hear back in about 50-60 days.
