Online: Check your registration or register to vote at <u>alabamavotes.gov</u>. You can only register online if you have an Alabama driver's license or non-driver ID.

By mail: Complete and submit a mail-in voter registration form (NVRA-2). Registration forms can be mailed to the Board of Registrars in the county in which you reside, or the Secretary of State's office at: Office of the Secretary of State, Elections Division, PO Box 5616, Montgomery, AL 36103.

-3 -

In person: Visit your local Board of Registrars and submit a registration form in person.

APPLY FOR A CERTIFICATE



A CERV application is a one-page form requesting your contact information, some details of your disqualifying conviction(s), and your signature. Use the QR code to print, complete, and submit to Pardons & Paroles. Expect to hear back in about 50-60 days.
